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ABOUT OUR FEATURED SPEAKERS

Daniel Warren, MD



Dr. Daniel Warren is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Kansas School of Medicine-Wichita. His primary clinical focus is addiction medicine, serving a population that is primarily composed of patients with opioid use disorder. He received medical training from University of Kansas School of Medicine, graduating in 2009. He then completed three years of family medicine training at Puget Sound Family Medicine Residency while active duty in the US Navy. After that, he was stationed at Naval Hospital Oak Harbor for four years, working primarily in an ambulatory clinic. During that time he chaired the hospital's Chronic Opioid Therapy Committee and developed an interest in chronic pain management. After separating honorably from the US Navy, he completed addiction medicine fellowship at Oregon Health and Science University. This year-long fellowship involved training in hospital consultation, medically managed withdrawal, ambulatory pain and addiction treatment, and opioid treatment programs. Returning to Wichita and University of Kansas School of Medicine in 2017, Dr. Warren became involved in substance use prevention, treatment, and recovery efforts in a number of settings. He is medical director of Wichita Comprehensive Treatment Center, an opioid treatment program. He also provides office-based opioid treatment at HealthCore Clinic, a federally-qualified health center. He is a representative in the local substance use prevention coalition, and he participates in multiple state committees addressing substance use, including the Kansas Citizens Committee and the Kansas Board of Healing Arts' Review Committee on controlled substance prescribing. Dr. Warren is passionate about educating and equipping students, residents, and practicing physicians to address substance use disorders, a growing cause of morbidity and mortality. His rotations serve as one of the only learning opportunities dedicated to clinical addiction education in the Wichita area. He has provided certification training to hundreds of medical professionals allowing them to prescribe buprenorphine, a medication treatment for opioid use disorder.

Shane Hudson, MS, MSCHT, LCP, LCAC

Shane Hudson is the President & CEO at CKF Addiction Treatment where he has served in various capacities over the last 11 years. Shane is a dually licensed clinician who also completed a Master of Health Care Transformation at University of Texas, Austin in 2020. He is a member of numerous local and state committees in order to provide advocacy for Kansans suffering from addiction as well as the field of addiction treatment as a whole. Shane is a recognized leader in promoting screening in medical settings, medication assisted treatment, and the use of technology to improve access to services. In 2021, Shane was appointed by Governor Laura Kelly to serve on the Governor's Behavioral Health Services Planning Council. CKF has partnered with 13 primary care clinics across the state to expand addiction health care access points and provide care to patients in underserved rural and frontier areas via telehealth. CKF serves nearly 2,000 patients annually through its detoxification, residential, outpatient, and telehealth services in Kansas. Through hospital-based services at Salina Regional and Stormont Vail, CKF serves an additional 5,500 patient annually. CKF was a recipient of the federal Opioid Grant through SAMHSA to serve eligible individuals in 65 central and western Kansas counties for 3 years. CKF Addiction Treatment provides medication assisted treatment (MAT) services, largely through the Opioid Grant, to 175 patients currently.
